

Medication & Document Organizer

Keep three travel questions separate

Screening permission, entry rules and medicine storage are different checks.

A medicine may be allowed through U.S. airport screening yet restricted in the destination country. A medicine that is permitted on the route may still need a particular storage arrangement. Use this organizer to collect professional and official answers without changing your own treatment.

1. Ask your pharmacist or prescriber about supply, packaging, storage and the travel timetable.
2. Check destination and transit-country requirements using official government or embassy information.
3. Check screening and airline instructions for liquids, sharps, medical equipment and batteries.
4. Keep essential medicines and the information needed to identify them accessible during travel.

Do not change a dose from this workbook

Write the instructions from the professional who knows the treatment. This workbook supplies organization and questions, not a medication schedule or medical recommendation.

Worked example: separating a medicine query

Fictional traveler; no medicine, dose or storage condition is being prescribed.

Question	Who answers it	Where the traveler records it
Can it pass screening?	Relevant screening authority	Rule URL and date checked
Can it enter the destination?	Destination government / embassy	Written official answer
How is it stored?	Pharmacist / manufacturer instructions	Exact permitted conditions
How does travel affect timing?	Prescriber / pharmacist	Individual written plan

The traveler first wrote “medical liquids allowed.” That did not answer import permission or storage. They now keep three separate confirmations. The airline is asked about equipment carriage; it is not asked to decide the treatment schedule.

The question I was combining with another question

The appropriate person or authority for each answer
